


## Christopher Columbus: A Family Adventure and A Plague of Bunnies




HER GRANDFATHER SERVED PRINCE HENRY

THEY MOVED TO THE ISLAND OF PORTO SANTO. FELIPA'S FATHER WAS THE FIRST GOVERNOR OF THE ISLAND BEFORE HE DIED MANY YEARS EARLIER. HER MOTHER GAVE COLUMBUS BARTOLOMEU'S CHARTS AND MAPS, AND WHILE ON THE ISLAND, COLUMBUS HEARD MANY STORIES FROM PORTUGUESE EXPLORERS. MANY OF THE STORIES PROBABLY HAD TO DO WITH SEEING THINGS ON THE AFRICAN CONTINENT THAT NO EUROPEAN HAD SEEN BEFORE. BUT THE STRANGEST STORY HAD HAPPENED RIGHT THERE ON THE ISLAND OF PORTO SANTO. IT INVOLVED A PLAGUE OF BUNNIES.
